

## NO 12, KNIGHTON GRANGE ROAD

Buildings current use – Residential  
Architects – Unknown  
Built - Circa 1905 - 1920

The property is substantial in size and constructed from red brick with cream render, red brick chimney stacks with tall chimney pots and tile pitched roofs. To the right hand side of property there is a large double protruding bay. The first floors of each bay have identical 10 light casement windows with identical two casement light windows to the ground floor. The right hand one also has a protruding triangular bay window to the ground floor and the left hand a recessed entrance. To the left hand side is a later addition of another, slightly smaller double protruding bay with render to the first floor and brick to the ground floor. The right hand has a six light casement window to the first floor and the left hand an eight light casement window to the first floor. The ground floors of the left hand bays both contain garages. Between the two sets of double protruding bays is a large protruding entrance with mono pitched roof and a triple panelled door. Above is an eight light casement window.



<b>Age</b>	Yes. The property was first built circa 1905 – 1920.
<b>Architectural</b>	Yes. Although simple the, the property is very individual in style and scale.
<b>Group Value</b>	No.
<b>Historic</b>	Unknown.
<b>Rarity</b>	Yes. Many of the properties built within the locale during the same period were individually designed for those who were to occupy the building.
<b>Social/Communal</b>	No.

## NO 13, KNIGHTON GRANGE ROAD

Buildings current use – Children’s Nursery  
Architects – Unknown  
Built circa – 1905 - 1920

The property is built from red brick with slate hipped, pitched and gablet slate roof. To the centre of the property is a protruding bay with gablet roof and a three light canted oriel bay window to the first floor. To the ground floor is a square five light bay window with adjoining entrance porch. Either side of the bay are two light dormer windows to the eaves. On the right hand side to the ground floor is a canted three light bay window. To the left hand side, is a semi circular three light window. Either side of this are two light casement windows.



<b>Age</b>	Yes. The property was built circa 1905 – 1920.
<b>Architectural</b>	Yes. The property has some interesting features such as hipped, pitched and gablet roofs, protruding bays, dormer windows and a semi circular window.
<b>Group Value</b>	No.
<b>Historic</b>	Unknown.
<b>Rarity</b>	Yes. Many of the properties built within the locale during the same period were individually designed for those who were to occupy the building.
<b>Social/Communal</b>	Yes. The property is currently used as a children’s nursery.

## **NO. 14 KNIGHTON GRANGE ROAD**

Buildings current use – Residential  
Architects – Unknown  
Built circa 1910 - 15

The property is constructed of red brick over two and a half storeys on a blue brick plinth, under a multiple clay tiled roof. The main entrance to the property is on its eastern face; through a portico with fluted columns. The southern façade has two parapeted gables with stone copings, and a further two storey square parapeted bay projecting from the right hand gable. There is also a dormer set above the eaves line. The central section to the southern façade has painted stone sills to its first floor windows only.



<b>Age</b>	Yes. The property was built between 1910 and 1915.
<b>Architectural</b>	Yes. The property has design features reminiscent of the time, for example the parapeted gables and portico with fluted columns.
<b>Group Value</b>	No.
<b>Historic</b>	Unknown
<b>Rarity</b>	Yes. Many of the properties built within the locale during the same period were individually designed for those who were to occupy the building.
<b>Social/Communal</b>	No.

## NO 15, KNIGHTON GRANGE ROAD

Buildings current use – Residential  
Architects – Unknown  
Built circa 1905 -1920

The property is constructed from red brick under a plain clay tile roof in the Vernacular Revival Style. It is a two storey building with pitched roofs. The west wing has been altered to accommodate a garage. The north facade, a cross wing ending in a parapeted gable. An eight light French window with semi circular head opens onto a timber balcony with turned balustrade. This being supported by a ten light canted bay window, the upper five lights being of stained glass. The first floor west corner of the facade is chamfered featuring a canted two light window based on a broached stop. The east side has two large two storey bay windows. A low garden wall is a recent addition.



<b>Age</b>	Yes. The property was built circa 1905 – 1920.
<b>Architectural</b>	Yes. The property illustrates many interesting architectural features, including parapeted gables and timber balcony.
<b>Group Value</b>	No.
<b>Historic</b>	Unknown.
<b>Rarity</b>	Yes. Many of the properties built within the locale during the same period were individually designed for those who were to occupy the building.

## NO. 16 KNIGHTON GRANGE ROAD

Buildings current use – residential  
Architects – Seale and Riley  
Built circa 1909

The property is constructed of red brick in traditional English brick bond, over three storeys, under a plain clay tile roof. The property has a number of projecting gables over three storeys and single storey ground floor bays. The eastern gable is characterised by its half timber black and white design. The roof has exposed trusses painted white under eaves as well as tall narrow chimney stacks with decorative tops. The windows to the property have shallow arches of plain tile and are timber frame painted white. Historical mapping suggests that the eastern bays and the northern extensions were added a number of years after its initial construction.



<b>Age</b>	Yes. The property was constructed circa 1909.
<b>Architectural</b>	Yes. The property was designed by local architects Seale and Riley of Horsefair Street, Leicester. The property is of a large scale and has a number of nice architectural elements, for example the three storey projecting gables, the tall narrow chimney stacks and the exposed timber trusses under eaves.
<b>Group Value</b>	No.
<b>Historic</b>	Unknown.
<b>Rarity</b>	Yes. Many of the properties built within the locale during the same period were individually designed for those who were to occupy the building.
<b>Social/Communal</b>	No.

## NO 17, KNIGHTON GRANGE ROAD

Buildings current use – Residential  
Architects – Norman Read  
Built circa 1915

The house is built from red brick with blue headers and a plain clay tile roof which has exposed rafters at the eaves. There is a clay tile stringcourse. The house is in the Arts and Crafts style with some classical or Queen Anne features. The property is L shaped in plan with a front wing, the main axis running East to West. The North facade features two circular windows, a panelled front door with nine light windows which is set into a recessed porch with a lead canopy and stone architrave and head. The stairwell is illuminated by a six light window spanning the height of the first floor. Windows are of timber frame with leaded lights. Other interesting features include a splayed double chimney stack.



<b>Age</b>	Yes. The property was built in 1915.
<b>Architectural</b>	Yes. The property was built by local architects Norman Read of Leicester and contains some interesting architectural features including arts and craft styling, circular windows and a splayed double chimney stack.
<b>Group Value</b>	No.
<b>Historic</b>	Unknown.
<b>Rarity</b>	Yes. Many of the properties built within the locale during the same period were individually designed for those who were to occupy the building.
<b>Social/Communal</b>	No.

**NO 18, KNIGHTON GRANGE ROAD**

Buildings current use – Residential  
Architects – Unknown  
Built circa – 1905 – 1920

The house was built in the first half of the 20<sup>th</sup> Century in a Neo-Georgian style. It has a clay tile hipped roof and a loggia on the southern facade. The walls have been rendered white. The upper floor has six windows with the pattern being reflected on the ground floor with the inclusion of the front door. The chimney stacks are upon subsidiary gabled dormers masking the joint with the main roof.



<b>Age</b>	Yes. Built circa 1905 – 1920.
<b>Architectural</b>	Yes. The property is of a large scale and has a number of nice architectural elements including hipped roofs, gabled dormers and a loggia.
<b>Group Value</b>	No.
<b>Historic</b>	Unknown.
<b>Rarity</b>	Yes. Many of the properties built within the locale during the same period were individually designed for those who were to occupy the building.

**NO 19, KNIGHTON GRANGE ROAD**

Buildings current use – residential  
Architects – Unknown  
Built – Unknown

The property is built from red brick on a blue brick plinth with slate pitched roofs and barge boards to the eaves. To the right hand side of the property is a double protruding bay. To the first floor of each bay is a casement window with brick arch above. To the left hand side of these there is a three light casement window to the first floor with a brick arched receding entrance porch below.

<b>Architectural</b>	Yes. The property is simple in style but has some interesting architectural details such as double bays and brick arches.

## NO 20, KNIGHTON GRANGE ROAD

Buildings current use – Residential  
Architects – Unknown  
Built – 1996

The house was redeveloped in 1996, but is an excellent example of how modern architecture can reflect the local character. It is built from red brick with blue brick damp course and half timber above the sill level. The roofs are pitched pan tile with red brick chimney stacks with oversailing detail. To the upper floor is a four light leaded casement window above a six light leaded square bay window with hipped tile roof. To the right of the building is a large protruding bay with half timber to the first and second floors, diaper bond to the ground floor and tile roof. The second floor has a single light leaded casement window, with a four light leaded casement window on the first floor and a six light leaded square bay window with flat roof on the ground floor. To the left hand side are two light leaded casement windows to the first and ground floors. To the left of the protruding bay is another smaller protruding bay also diaper bond with a large L-shaped seven light leaded and stained glass casement window and brick detail to the eaves. To the front of this is a smaller single storey protruding gable which serves as an entrance porch.



<b>Age</b>	No.
<b>Architectural</b>	Yes. The house has many interesting design features typical of the Arts and Crafts period, despite being a modern house.
<b>Group Value</b>	No.
<b>Historic</b>	No.
<b>Rarity</b>	Yes. The property was individually designed and is the only one of this age in this style within the Borough.

**NO 21, KNIGHTON GRANGE ROAD**

Buildings current use – Residential

The property is constructed from red brick with white render to the first floor, tile pitched roofs and red brick chimney stacks with string course and oversailing. To the front faced there is a protruding bay and on the right hand wall of this a full height canted bay window.

## NO 23, KNIGHTON GRANGE ROAD

The property is constructed from red brick with white render to the first floor and protruding brick string at the join and pitched tile roofs with extended eaves and barge boards. To the front of the property under the gable there is an eight light canted oriel bay window with hipped tile roof. Beneath this is a six light brick arched window with a small two light window to the left hand side of this. To the right of the oriel window is a six light casement window. To the left hand side, set back there is a further bay with red brick chimney and narrow two light windows beside it to the ground and first floors. To the right hand side of this bay is a small entrance porch with half pitched tile roof and horizontal two light window.

**NO 24, KNIGHTON GRANGE ROAD**

The property is built from red brick with tile pitched roofs with red brick chimney stacks with oversailing detail and tall chimney pots. The front of the property has two protruding bays with barge boards to the gables and half timbering. The right hand bay has a protruding canted six light bay window to ground and first floor with a flat roof and the left hand bay has a five light casement window to the first floor and fourteen light square bay window to the ground floor. Between the two bays to the first floor is a four light casement window. To the ground floor there is a half pitched tile roof providing the entrance porch.

**NO 25, KNIGHTON GRANGE ROAD**

The property is constructed from buff brick with hipped tile roofs with extended eaves. On the front facade of the building there is a dormer window above the eaves line with four lights and with hipped tile roofs with extended eaves. To the eaves line there is brick detailing. The first floor has four, four light casement windows with two central three light casement windows. The ground floor has a large protruding entrance porch with hipped tile roofs with extended eaves and a large recessed doorway and a shallow single light window either side. To either side of the entrance porch is a square bay window with hipped tile roofs with extended eaves.

**NO 26, KNIGHTON GRANGE ROAD**

The property is constructed from red brick with tile cladding, white render with red brick chimney stacks with oversailing and tall chimney pots. The front of the property has two projecting bays. The right hand side one has ten light canted bay windows to the ground and first floors and is tile clad. The left hand bay has white render above the first floor sill level and tile cladding below to the top of the ground floor window. There are twelve light square bay windows to the ground and first floors with a dovecote above the first floor window. Between the two bays is a canted dormer window with flat roof, surrounded by a hipped catslide roof over the entrance porch supported by composite columns.

To the front of the property, to the left hand side, there is a protruding bay with tile pitched roof, with barge boards to the gables and half timbering to the gable and between the ground and first floor windows. To the ground and first floor there are two light casement windows on each side of the bay with eight light casement windows to the front face. To the right of this there are further casement windows to the first floor and to the ground floor an entrance portico with double entrance doors.

## NO 29, KNIGHTON GRANGE ROAD

The property is substantial in size and built from red brick with red brick chimney stacks around a courtyard with outbuildings to the rear with tile hipped roofs. The front of the building has been substantially extended from the original plan. To the right hand side of the front facia is a protruding bay with balcony to the first floor. To the centre of the front facia is a single storey protruding bay with flat roof and parapet which provides the entrance hallway.

**NO 30, KNIGHTON GRANGE ROAD**

Buildings current use – Residential

The property is built from red brick with a tile hipped roof and red brick chimney stacks with string course. To the left hand side is a protruding bay with pitched tile roof with parapeted gables. To the first floor of this is a two light brick arched window with two, two light brick arched windows to the ground floor. To the right of this is a canted bay with parapet with two light brick arched windows to each face on the ground and first floors. Right of this is a two light casement window to the first floor. Right again is a three light casement window to the first floor with below, a canted bay window with parapet and two light brick arched casement windows to each face.

**NO 32, KNIGHTON GRANGE ROAD**

The property is substantial in size and covered in cream render with red tile pitched roofs with overhanging eaves and red brick chimney stacks with string detail, oversailing and chimney pots. To the centre of the front facade is a large protruding bay with a twelve light canted bay window with flat roof to the first and ground floors. To the right hand side is a slightly smaller protruding bay with red tile catslide roof and a four light casement window with a plaque above.

## NO. 33 KNIGHTON GRANGE ROAD

Buildings current use – Residential  
Architects – AE and TT Sawday  
Built circa 1920

No. 33 is a fine residential property of reasonable size, with an arts and crafts influenced design. The property is predominately rendered walls on a red brick plinth, with a plain tile hipped dormer roof design. The property is expressed in two masses, one the main building, the second a former coach house. The main building has a full height front projecting main entrance with a stone surround (north side). The former coach house is adjoining the western side of the main building and has a half hipped gambrel roof, the lower plane of which is broken by a tall 4 light canted bay window. All the windows in the property are timber framed with leaded glass apart from the ground floor bay on the main building which has been modified.



<b>Age</b>	Yes. The property was built circa 1920.
<b>Architectural</b>	Yes. The property is believed to have been designed by AE and TT Sawday who were renowned architects in the area at the time. The property is a fine example of the arts and crafts influence.
<b>Group Value</b>	No.
<b>Historic</b>	Yes. The property was built circa 1920 and was one of the first properties to be built in the area. The property is located within the Oadby Hill Top and Meadowcourt Conservation Area.
<b>Rarity</b>	Yes. Many of the properties built within the locale during the same period were individually designed for those who were to occupy the building.
<b>Social/Communal</b>	No.

**NO 34, KNIGHTON GRANGE ROAD**

Buildings current use – Residential  
Architects – Unknown  
Built – Unknown

The property is built in brindle brick with flat parapeted roofs with stone capstones to the parapets. To the right hand side of the front faced is a single storey protruding bay with flat parapeted roof. Above this to the first floor is a semicircular bay window with five narrow single lights and a crenulated parapet. To the left of the bay is a large five light casement window.

**NO 37, KNIGHTON GRANGE ROAD**

Buildings current use – Residential  
Architects – A.E. & T Sawday  
Built – circa 1909

The house is two storeys built from red and blue brick, tiled with Cotswold slate. The chimney stacks are of decorative shape on plan and use is made of oversailing brick courses. The house faces north with the entrance set at an angle between the main building and the east wing. It has a portico with Tuscan columns with lead embossed cornice. Above is a six light bay window with a hipped roof. The window features restored stained glass. The ground floor is both brick and render and features a bay window with brick mullions and transom. The house has undergone recent restoration and much of the timberwork is stained pine. To the right hand side is a large elaborate garage with large pillars either side of the entrance, and a protruding bay above with leaded windows and hipped roofs with red brick chimneys with oversailing.



<b>Age</b>	Yes. The house is over 100 years old.
<b>Architectural</b>	Yes. The house was built by A.E. & T. Sawday and has some interesting architectural features including decorative chimney stacks, portico and embossed cornice, hipped slate roofs and stained glass.
<b>Group Value</b>	No.
<b>Historic</b>	Unknown.
<b>Rarity</b>	Yes. Many of the properties built within the locale during the same period were individually designed for those who were to occupy the building.

## NO 38, KNIGHTON GRANGE ROAD

Buildings current use – Residential  
Architects – Stockwell Harrison and Sons  
Built – circa 1904 -1908

The house has been built in a free style adaptation of Arts and Craft or Vernacular Revival. The building is entirely rendered with a plain clay tile roof and stands on a north/south axis. Interesting features include on the western front the main entrance via a portico with two Tuscan Columns in sandstone supporting a large eight light half hexagonal oriel window clad in waney edged weather board. Weather board is also used on a jettied portion of the upper storey to the right of the entrance. To the rear, the east side features two full height bays clad in weather board joined on the upper floor by a balcony with turned balustrade and hipped roof. Other roofs are plain gabled. Windows are timber framed and feature leaded lights.



<b>Age</b>	Yes. The house was constructed circa 1904 – 1908.
<b>Architectural</b>	Yes. The house was built by architects Stockwell Harrison and Sons and features several interesting architectural features such as an entrance portico with Tuscan columns, an oriel bay window, weather board cladding, full height bays and a balcony.
<b>Group Value</b>	No.
<b>Historic</b>	Unknown.
<b>Rarity</b>	Yes. Many of the properties built within the locale during the same period were individually designed for those who were to occupy the building.
<b>Social/Communal</b>	No.

## BEAUMOUNT LEYS NO 39, KNIGHTON GRANGE ROAD

Buildings current use – Residential  
Architects – W. Barrow  
Built circa 1903

The house was constructed in 1903 from red brick with a clay tile roof. The north facade has a left hand side full height canted bay with upper and lower eight light windows. The bay is gabled with half timbering and barge boards. The right hand corner carries a similar full height bay with upper and lower eight light windows. Between the bays there is a six light sash window on each floor. The east and west sides have similar arrangements with outbuildings being adjoined to the south side. The roof features ornamental ridge tiles with terracotta finials at the gables and ridge ends. The upper and lower courses of the plinth are red and blue brick respectively.



<b>Age</b>	Yes. The property is over 100 years old.
<b>Architectural</b>	Yes. The property was built by Leicester architect W. Barrow and has several interesting architectural features such as half timbered gabled bays and ornamental ridge tiles and finials.
<b>Group Value</b>	No.
<b>Historic</b>	Unknown.
<b>Rarity</b>	Yes. Many of the properties built within the locale during the same period were individually designed for those who were to occupy the building.

## NO 40, KNIGHTON GRANGE ROAD

Buildings current use – Residential.  
Architects – Unknown  
Built – Unknown

The property is substantial in size and covered in white render with red brick chimney stacks and tile pitched roofs. To the right hand side of the front facia are two dormer windows with pitched roofs to the eaves. To the left hand side are two protruding bays with the left hand being substantially larger. This also has a protruding bay from the right hand facia which crosses the front facia of the other bay forming a square with a skylight to the centre. There are outbuildings to the rear of the property.



<b>Age</b>	Unknown.
<b>Architectural</b>	Yes. The property has some interesting architectural features such as tall chimney stacks, and protruding bays.
<b>Group Value</b>	No.
<b>Historic</b>	Unknown.
